



FREQUENTLY ASKED QUESTIONS (FAQs)

The Royal School of Church Music (RSCM) is a unique charity committed to nurturing the best use of music in worship. We have 8,500 members and friends active in over forty countries, encouraged by 750 volunteers and a small central staff.

Categories of membership

Why should my church become an Affiliate of the RSCM?

As an Affiliate your church or organization will play a vital part in the RSCM's work and mission, and receive specialist help and support through a wide range of membership benefits. You'll have access to events and training courses for all ages and levels of ability, publications, resources (a copy of our liturgy planner *Sunday by Sunday*), discounts and other information to enable you to plan and carry out musical worship effectively.

Why should I become an Individual Member of the RSCM?

If you are actively involved in church, school, or community music, consider joining us as an Individual Member. You'll benefit on an individual basis from the opportunities, resources and discounts available to members, and play an important role in the RSCM's work.

Why should I become a Friend of the RSCM?

By joining as a Friend you are investing in the future of live music in worship, by helping us to train current and future leaders, arrange inspirational courses and events, support RSCM choirs, encourage outreach through our network of local volunteers and publish new music resources for churches and schools. Do I have to be a member to go on a course or take part in an event?

No, but Individual and Affiliate members receive valuable discounted rates.

Money

Is the RSCM a non-profit organization?

Yes, we rely chiefly on subscriptions from Affiliates, Individuals, and Friends, funds raised by our volunteers, and donations.

Our church doesn't have any money in the budget.

Because we are a not-for-profit organization, membership is extremely affordable for the value offered!

What do I get for my money?

Each membership category outlined on our website provides specific benefits, including free subscriptions to a range of inspiring membership publications (Affiliate and Individual Membership includes the liturgy planner *Sunday by Sunday*), discounts on music and materials and course registration fees. You'll also receive incredible benefits from the RSCM's work encouraging singing, developing training programs, working with music leaders and clergy, representing church music within national and international church bodies, and ensuring the development and availability of repertoire.

How is the money from my membership subscription used?

Subscriptions are our main source of income and support all that we do. Your money helps publish printed resources; run, promote, and develop important training courses; and work with volunteers locally and internationally to administer and carry out our work.

Music styles and church denominations

My church is not Anglican; is the RSCM for me?

We are open to all church denominations, and have school and community choirs among our members. The RSCM aims to further the goals of all those engaged in church music.

My church doesn't have a choir; is the RSCM for me?

We support community choirs, organists, instrumentalists and solo singers.

My church doesn't have an organ; is the RSCM for me?

You don't need to have an organ to have good church music. We can help you find the right music for your church.

My church is evangelical/my church is charismatic/my church doesn't have traditional music; is the RSCM for me?

We help support churches across the whole spectrum of theology and churchmanship. It's very important to have inspiring music that is appropriate for your church, community and your worship context and theology. Many churches are discovering the richness of various styles of music at different services or within a single service.

Publishing

What does the RSCM publish? Is it suitable for my church?

The RSCM Press publishes music for the church and educational materials. Our music covers the full range of musical styles and resources, serving the needs of everyone from those with no choir to those with extensive musical resources. We have a very small music budget. What discounts are available to members?

Affiliated churches and choirs receive 25% discount on RSCM publications purchased through RSCM Music Direct. Lois Fyfe Music, Cliff Hill Music, and GIA Publications also offer discounts. Individual Members receive a 25% discount on single copies. Many of our core publications have pages which can be photocopied so that they are affordable for small churches or choirs.

Why are the discounts only on RSCM publications?

RSCM is not a trading company, and sales of our publications are handled by an external distributor, SCM-Canterbury Press. We can therefore offer discounts only on our own publications as their terms with other publishers and suppliers vary.

What is Church Music Skills?

Church Music Skills is a pioneering new education program designed to help practicing church musicians develop practical skills. Students select the most appropriate "stream" to pursue (i.e. for organists, choir directors, cantors or ensemble leaders) then supplement with a range of supporting studies. *Church Music Skills* is based on distance learning, combining private study at home with practical experience in the student's own church. www.rscm.com/skills
